Armbruster 2011-10-17 Seattle is a music town with rich, deep roots that have influenced the culture and identity of its civic life for decades. **The Combat Zone** Jan Brogan 2021-09-24 At the end of the 1976 football season, more than thirty Harvard athletes went to Boston's Combat Zone to celebrate. In the city's adult entertainment district, drugs and prostitution ran rampant, violent crime was commonplace, and corrupt police turned the other way. At the end of the night, Italian American star athlete Andy Puopolo, raised in the city's North End, was murdered in a stabbing. Three African American men were accused of the crime.
