Unlike many antebellum planters who portrayed their involvement with slavery as a historical burden bestowed onto them

by their ancestors, Polk entered the slave business of his own volition, for reasons principally of financial self-interest. The very next day, he authorized the purchase, in strictest secrecy, of six more very young slaves. By contrast with Senator John C. Calhoun, President Polk has been seen as a moderate Southern Democratic leader. But Dusinberre suggests that the president's political stance toward slavery-- influenced as it was by his deep personal involvement in the plantation system-- may actually have helped precipitate the Civil War that Polk sought to avoid.
